Celebrating 50 years of rich history

In 2021, Burgmann College celebrated 50 years as a respectful, inclusive and egalitarian academic and social community. We were fortunate to have commemorated this wonderful milestone with special events during the first half of the year, while we sadly had to postpone our 50th Anniversary Back-to-Burg Weekend to 19–21 August 2022 due to the pandemic.

On 31 March, we commemorated the anniversary of the laying of our Foundation Stone (31 March 1968), giving all members of our community the opportunity to celebrate and reminisce on the rich history of the College while also looking towards our future.

College leadership, alumni, residents, staff and special guests attended, including ANU Vice Chancellor Professor Brian Schmidt who paid tribute to Burgmann's 50-year history.

"Burgmann College is the best practice model for residences at the ANU," said Schmidt.

"We are truly proud to have you as part of the ANU community."

At this event we laid out our vision for "Building a Bigger Burgmann", launching the new College Master Plan which envisages innovative and modern spaces to enhance the unique residential experience Burgmann has always offered.

With the generous support of Burgmann residents who pledged \$100,000 from the Resident Building Levy, 2021 BRA President Isobel Kuo was delighted to launch our annual fundraising appeal for the Undergraduate Courtyard Redevelopment Project alongside President of the Burgmann College Alumni Association, Matthew Lobb.



Supporting one another through difficult times

While 2020 was possibly the most challenging year in the College's history, 2021 continued to deliver unparalleled challenges for our community, particularly in Semester 2. The Canberra snap-lockdown on 12 August required all residents to isolate in their rooms from 5:00 PM, and while the restrictions eased somewhat over time, the lockdown continued until 14 October.

The spirit and resilience of our community shone through this period; our dedicated residents, staff, alumni and friends rallied to support one another. We delivered Luigi's hot scones with jam and cream to residents' rooms, installed hammocks on the back lawn for our residents' daily outdoor hour, and residents led events such as Zoom yoga, COVID-safe gardening bees, and murder mystery nights to maintain social connection, wellbeing and community.



Establishing the College's Advancement Program

In 2021, the College appointed our inaugural Director of Advancement, solidifying the College's strong and ongoing commitment to its Advancement Program. Formerly a dedicated Deputy and Acting Principal throughout her five years with Burgmann, Ms. Amelia Zaraftis was **appointed Director of Advancement** and commenced her role in May 2021.

In partnership with the Burgmann College Alumni Association, the Advancement Office worked to shape a vibrant and continuing Alumni Relations program, with a new events calendar, improved communications, and the launch of our Annual Alumni Awards program. Under Amelia's dedicated leadership, the College also commenced our Annual Appeal program and began the important work of building a major gifts program for Burgmann with a view to ensuring the future of the College for future generations.



Alumni Awards introduced in our 50th year

We were honoured to announce the inaugural recipients of the **Burgmann College Alumni Awards**. We are a community made up of amazing people, and we were incredibly proud to celebrate the achievements, commitment and compassion of our 2021 alumni, volunteer and staff recipients.



Generous support from all parts of our community

We were thrilled and humbled that **100 new donors** chose to chose to support the College during our 50th anniversary year, contributing to the College's Annual Appeal and other priority areas including the New Beginnings Bursary, Residents' Hardship, and Principal's Priorities Fund.

The year also saw the rejuvenation of our Workplace Giving Program, with 50 percent of our staff contributing to the College's fundraising efforts. This phenomenal show of support from our staff exemplifies our workplace culture.

Burgmann staff believe their gifts help shape the next generation of residents.

In March, we were delighted to receive the final gifts in order to achieve the \$23,500 necessary for the inaugural purchases in our **First Nations Arts Initiative** collection. The generous support of donors enabled the College to purchase four remarkable works by First Nations artists. These included an exceptional photographic portrait of Ngambri Elder Dr. Aunty Matilda House by the esteemed First Nations photographer Dr. Brenda L. Croft (Gurindji/Malngin/Mudburra Peoples; Anglo-Australian/Chinese/German/Irish heritage), which was short-listed in the 2020 National Photographic Portrait Prize at the National Portrait Gallery, and now hangs in the Grenfell Price Room.

By December, it was truly heartening to reach our ambitious \$100,000 goal towards the Undergraduate Courtyard Redevelopment Project, with special thanks to Global Philanthropic, StarRez and the Australian Bedding Company for their generous support. This project will see a major upgrade to our much-cherished outdoor social hub and barbecue space on the Back Lawn, connecting this area directly to the college bar, Le Chat Noir, through a new doorway.

Overall, with thanks to our generous donors, we raised **\$158,846** in 2021, allowing the College to make progress in supporting residents in times of hardship, supporting First Nations residents, honouring and celebrating First Nations artists, and improving future resident amenities.
